


Open ENROLLMENT

We thank the voting Gana-A'Yoo shareholders who helped us achieve the 68.1 percent quorum this year. We also thank them for making the historical decision to open enrollment to shareholder descendants. Descendant enrollment will begin in September 2022.



Once enrollment is open, Gana-A'Yoo will require applicants to submit the following documents:

- Class E application.
- Original birth certificate; note that an original birth certificate is the only document that will be accepted. An original birth certificate can be obtained by contacting your local vital statistics office.
- If adopted by one or both parents, an adoption form must also be completed.
- Certificate of Indian Blood or Tribal Enrollment specifying Alaska Native blood quantum.

Additional documents, *if applicable*, include:

- Proof of name change, **if name is different** than listed on birth certificate.
- Proof of custodianship, if not a biological or adoptive parent.
- Paternity affidavit, if father is not listed on child's birth certificate.
- Adoption court order, if adopted by one or both parents. Documents must show the biological parent(s) name(s).

SHAREHOLDER *of the Year*

The Gana-A'Yoo Board of Directors selected two Shareholder of the Year recipients: **Judy (Ekada) Madros** and **Andrea (Durny) Nield**, both of Nulato. The award recognizes shareholders who model the mission, vision and values of Gana-A'Yoo by contributing to our communities, providing stability and opportunity for our shareholders to be successful on their own terms while respecting our land, culture, language and traditional values.



Madros was a teacher for the Yukon-Koyukuk School District for over 20 years and has impacted many people of all ages in their educational endeavors. She currently serves as the behavioral health aide in the community of Nulato. She is described as honest, hard-working and responsible. You can find Madros and her husband, Vernon Madros Sr., along with their kids and grandkids, taking part in traditional activities throughout the year. They enjoy harvesting fish, berries and moose to provide sustenance not only for their immediate family but also to share with their extended family members. Madros is known to be a strong and trustworthy woman who will give her all to anyone in need.

Nield has dedicated much of her life to helping students and athletes work towards their potential, not only in the Fairbanks North Star Borough, but throughout the Yukon-Koyukuk area school district. She is an avid volunteer in her community, coaching basketball and mentoring youth. Relatively recently, Nield re-awakened her grandmother's fishing area in Nulato and spends her time in the summer teaching her children how to live off the land. Nield is married to Chris Nield and is the daughter of Paula Curran and Andy Durny.



Village Spotlight **GALENA OUTDOOR ADVENTURE CLASS**

Springtime in the Interior provides longer days and, with that, opportunities to get outside. That is exactly what the Galena outdoor adventure class experienced in March. Shareholder Jerry Nollner Sr., power mechanics teacher William Kramer, and social studies teacher Ashley Kramer chaperoned six high school students on a 3-mile snowshoe trek for an overnight camping trip at a long-term ecological research site. Gana-A'Yoo, Limited allowed the group land access in partnership with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the City of Galena and the Loudon Tribal Council.



Subsidiary Spotlight **GANNA-A'YOO CONSTRUCTION SERVICES**

Gana-A'Yoo Construction Services Joint Venture (GCS) was formed in January 2021, combining the past performance of our two construction-oriented subsidiaries: Kaiyuh Services and Khotol Services. The joint venture has been successful in winning two contracts. The first was awarded in October from Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, located in Dayton, Ohio, otherwise known as the birthplace of aviation. The contract is for the Simplified Acquisition of Base Engineering Requirements (SABER) and has the potential for a 5.5-year contract length and a maximum construction value of \$127.5 million. Reinhard Mueller, vice president of operations, explained, "We are the only contractor serving this requirement at this Base, and work through a unique pricing system to arrive at a contract value for each parcel of work that the government requests for us to execute. The projects we execute vary widely in scope and complexity, ranging from \$15,000 to \$5,000,000 in size." GCS has been awarded 11 projects since beginning operations in December.


The second contract awarded to GCS is for a construction contract at Wallops Island in Virginia. The contract is with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), as part of a group of contractors that can bid on work on a restricted basis. Mueller commented that NASA is, "a desirable agency to work with, that has a bright future as we continue to reach for the stars."

"Gana-A'Yoo Construction Services Joint Venture is another tool in our business development toolbox that maximizes our opportunity to win work. Especially in the case of Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, we are very confident that this contract will provide an anchor of solid revenue for many years to come, while Gana-A'Yoo becomes a living part of the U.S. Air Force legacy of innovation in Dayton, Ohio."

Scholarship NEWS

The Gana-A'Yoo Foundation has launched AwardSpring, an all-online scholarship application, processing and awarding platform. Interested shareholders and shareholder descendants must apply for a Foundation scholarship online at ganaayoo.awardspring.com. To account for the change, the application deadline for the general and competitive scholarship has been extended to July 15, 2022. Short-term and vocational scholarship applications remain open year-round. Competitive, general, vocational and short-term scholarship applications must be submitted online.



There is an opportunity to apply for an Alyeska Alaska Native Program scholarship, which has an open application timeframe of May 23, 2022, through December 15, 2022. Alyeska Alaska Native Program scholarship applicants are required to be enrolled in degree and training programs specific to the Trans-Alaska Pipeline System (TAPS). LAND MANAGEMENT Policy

The natural resources committee last updated Gana-A'Yoo's land management policy manual in December 2020, with full Board of Directors' approval. As the fall moose hunting season is approaching, we are asking for shareholder comment and input regarding our land management policy. Our staff has been working on ways to acquire shareholder input; the policy manual was sent to our village tribal offices and city offices requesting comment in April. Our Gana-A'Yoo website is also getting updated to create a way to receive comments about the policy manual. Additionally, we are working to schedule virtual meetings for shareholders, tribes and governing bodies to discuss the policy manual. The virtual meeting times and dates will be published on the website, social media and at tribal, city and post offices.

The natural resources committee is scheduled to consider the following suggestions and comments, submitted by Loudon Tribal Council (dated May 2021):

1. *Page 10: Under Camping and Campsite Permits: Consider removing language concerning non-shareholder camping use of Gana-A'Yoo lands. Non-shareholders can utilize nearby state and federal public lands for camping, which would not disturb customary and traditional use of Gana-A'Yoo lands by shareholders and descendants.*
2. *Page 15: Under Game Policies, Trapping: Consider removing the trapping permit requirement for shareholders. Customary and traditional trapping practices long precede the policy manual, and shareholders know how to responsibly steward trapping grounds accordingly.*
3. *Page 15: Under Guiding: Because Gana-A'Yoo lands are owned for the purpose of local subsistence, it is not clear why commercial guiding is currently an allowable use and practice. Subsistence should be the demonstrable priority land use, and commercial guiding opportunities exist on nearby public state and federal lands.*

In the spirit of our collective ownership, stewardship and responsible use since time immemorial, we invite input, comments and suggestions from shareholders regarding the Gana-A'Yoo, Limited land management policy manual. Contact 907.569.9599 or lands@ganaayoo.com with any questions.
