

Caring for a Site of National Significance

Gana-A'Yoo subsidiary Six Mile is honored to provide operation and maintenance services for the Pentagon Memorial, a site dedicated to the 184 victims of the 9/11 attack on the Pentagon. This contract, awarded by the Department of Defense's Washington Headquarters Services, allows us to care for a national landmark that holds deep meaning for many Americans. Thank you to our 2024 interns—Evan Jones, Keirsten Madros, Tanaya Kriska, and Camden Cleaver—for their hard work and dedication!

Each internship was tailored to the needs of the community. Evan Jones spent the summer working outdoors for the Koyukuk Tribe, cutting brush, hauling trash, and transporting water. Reflecting on his experience, Evan said his favorite task was "cutting grass... at the baseball fields and in people's yards."

Keirsten Madros interned with the Kaltag Tribe, gaining valuable experience in administrative duties, data entry, community outreach, and preparing meeting packets for the council.

Tanaya Kriska and Camden Cleaver, interning with the Louden Tribe in Galena, built fish wheels and nets, prepared fish for the Elder Center, cut willows, jarred fish, and flagged traffic. Tanaya's favorite part was cutting fish and willows, while Camden enjoyed road flagging. Camden encourages future interns, saying, "Just go for it... it's a pretty fun job!"

These summer internships provide a chance for our young leaders to connect with their communities and cultural roots. Jasmine Olson, Kaltag Tribal Clerk, remarked, "Internships like these are important to teach our youth about tribal sovereignty. Thank you, Gana-A'Yoo!"

We are proud of our interns and their impact this summer, and we look forward to continuing this partnership to foster future generations of leaders.

My educational goals are to pursue a Doctorate in Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences at Washington State University (WSU). I have made the Dean's List for the first two years and aim to continue this achievement for the 2024-2025 school year. Throughout graduate school, I have been active in various campus organizations. This past year, I volunteered at the Crimson Gala, raising money for scholarships, served as a student ambassador, and taught youth about STEM. These experiences have contributed to my academic success and expanded my knowledge beyond the classroom. This upcoming year, I plan to continue striving for success through my academics and campus activities.

Ultimately, I aim to serve as a pharmacist in a rural Alaska Native (AN) community. Practicing in Unalakleet, Alaska, my father's hometown, would allow me to give back to my native community both culturally and in healthcare. I have spent many summers in Unalakleet, immersing myself in my Inupiaq culture, gathering subsistence foods, hunting, and volunteering at an elder facility. Receiving my doctorate in pharmacy will fulfill my long-term desire to advance healthcare services in AN communities.

At WSU's College of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences, I have participated in various community and student-led organizations that aim to better the community. As an active member of the American Clinical College of Pharmacy, I have attended meetings to understand clinical pharmacy and the importance of the pharmacist's role in patient care. I have also participated in student panels held by the WSU American Indian Health Science Club to encourage other Alaska Native/American Indian (AN/AI) students to pursue health education. These opportunities have given me the confidence to branch out of my comfort zone, pursue educational resources, and become a role model for the AN/AI community. The skills I obtain at WSU will contribute to my success as a practicing pharmacist in rural Alaska.

Being Alaska Native, I have witnessed the effects of addiction, domestic violence, and suicide on the health of the Alaska Native people. These outcomes are influenced by trauma, poverty, inadequate education, and limited access to quality healthcare. These experiences drive my desire to serve the Alaska Native population and become a role model. I first recognized the need for Alaska Native pharmacists while shadowing Dr. Darlene Huntington, a Village Health Pharmacist at Chief Andrew Isaac Health Center. She emphasized the need for pharmacists and clinical advancements in villages. Additionally, I worked as a Pharmacy Technician at the Alaska Native Medical Center in Anchorage for two years while studying at the University of Alaska Anchorage. These opportunities have deepened my appreciation for helping Alaska Natives and highlighted the need for quality healthcare services in our communities. A Doctor of Pharmacy degree will help me become a pharmacist who promotes quality healthcare for Alaska Native and American Indian populations.

I am currently a Doctor of Pharmacy candidate at Washington State University, with a strong commitment to advancing healthcare in rural Alaska Native communities. My professional journey is deeply rooted in my heritage as the granddaughter of Betty Huntington from Galena. I have gained valuable experience as a pharmacy intern at various institutions, including the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium. My goal is to use my skills to serve Alaska Native communities by providing essential healthcare services and promoting cultural awareness.



Forest Stewardship Plan

In line with Gana-A'Yoo's strategic goal to protect our lands for subsistence and cultural use, the Gana-A'Yoo Board of Directors and the Natural Resources Committee are working with Chugachmiut to update the company's Forest Stewardship Plan. The most recent plan was last updated in 2012. Since then, we have seen wild fires, climate change, and other environmental impacts to our forests that may require plan revisions.

The Forest Stewardship Plan promotes an overall condition of forest health to maximize growth, yield, and economic return from forested lands while prioritizing subsistence hunting, fishing, and gathering.
